DEAR FRIENDS,

Ten years ago, AWAKE was established in the Nashville community for one purpose: to make a positive impact on the lives of women and kids in Tennessee. Ever since our volunteer-led community has worked hard to make that mission a reality by focusing on **systems change**. Confronting the root causes of issues, rather than symptoms, and the policies that reinforce them is central to our theory of change. By transforming structures, mindsets, power dynamics, and policies through education and collective action, we seek to create long-lasting, transformational change in the state.

2023 marked our 10th anniversary as a nonprofit! This milestone gave us an opportunity to reflect on our growth over the last decade. Since 2020, our team has grown from solely volunteers to three full-time employees; our programming has reached more than 30 local nonprofits and MNPS schools; and we have successfully researched, drafted, and lobbied for 10 bills that have been signed into law. I am proud of the work we've accomplished by remaining true to our grassroots and responsive nature.

While we had much to celebrate, it would be disingenuous not to address the significant pain experienced by our community this year. The gun violence epidemic has increasingly impacted families across the state as the state's gun laws continue to weaken. The tragic mass shooting at The Covenant School this March was a catalyst for many Tennesseans to speak out and demand action, the tangible impact of which has yet to be seen.

Working toward systemic changes hardly ever produces immediate gratification. Instead, it asks us for perseverance, conviction, and bold hope. In my role at AWAKE, I have the privilege of witnessing the antidote to despair when it feels like our efforts are futile and our society is regressing: **community**. When we are working toward an equitable world together, we can share the weight of the struggle. This has looked as extraordinary as a crowd of hundreds of strangers singing "This Little Light of Mine" in the halls of the Capitol or as commonplace as an invitation to a TN Senator's office for refuge (and chocolate) when advocacy work becomes unbearable.

As we look ahead, we know the only constant is change; but we can all be active agents in shaping the future of Tennessee. Although there is unknown ahead of us, the team at AWAKE chooses to believe our efforts are moving us toward more freedom, more justice, and more thriving for ourselves and our neighbors. I invite you to join us as we create this future together.

HISTORY

AWAKE was formed by a group of volunteers who saw an opportunity to work strategically and effectively to create better policies in Tennessee for women, kids, and families. Since 2013, AWAKE has successfully researched, drafted, and guided ten bills to passage addressing issues like health disparities, genderbased violence, and child exploitation; launched a state-wide educational campaign on child abuse prevention; developed a truancy intervention program; and designed a curriculum that helps students learn about healthy relationships and financial independence. Through each of our collaborative efforts, we are guided by the conviction that historically-marginalized communities in Tennessee deserve to feel safe, lead healthy lives, and have equal access to opportunity.

OUR RESPONSE: EDUCATION & DEVLOPMENT

AWAKE's education initiatives have evolved over the years in response to community need, partnership opportunity, and staff capacity. We have served over 800 students and community members since we were established in 2013.

I AM AN ADVOCATE PROGRAM

Our flagship program aims to equip students with the tools to be advocates for themselves and change-makers in their communities. The curriculum supports participants in the development of interpersonal and self-care skills, sociopolitical consciousness, understanding of leadership, communication, and organizing skills essential to advocacy work.

STUDENT ADVISORY BOARD

AWAKE's Student Advisory Board is an initiative rooted in the principles of equity and justice that centers the decision-making power of youth. This annual program assembles a cohort of high school students to participate in a leadership opportunity that serves as a catalyst for effective youthfocused service across Tennessee. Our board members convene monthly to lend their insights to AWAKE's educational and legislative goals, engage in discussions with organizational leaders and guest speakers, learn vital skills in advocacy leadership, and embark on self-determined advocacy projects addressing relevant social issues.

YOUTH ADVOCACY SUMMIT

This was the inaugural year of AWAKE's Youth Advocacy Summit, a full-day event immersing middle and high school students in a comprehensive exploration of a systemic social issue and empowering them to create innovative solutions. Participants learn the root causes, implications, and existing interventions of a relevant social issue, then divide into teams to create an advocacy solution project to pitch to a panel of judges.

2023 IMPACT

SUMMIT ISSUE FOCUS: Homelessness in Nashville

YOUTH ADVOCACY SUMMIT



The winning team pitched "**The Happy Homes Project**:" an innovative housing project advocating for a sustainable community of compact homes made from recycled, multifunctional materials. The project's framework is based on fostering interpersonal connections and nurturing a collective sense of stewardship, facilitating the transition of residents towards the next phase of their life journey.

We accelerate systemic changes by identifying laws that negatively impact the lives of women and young people. Together with our statewide partners and champion lawmakers we have drafted, lobbied for, and passed ten bills that have had an immediate and significant impact on the lives of thousands of Tennesseans.

2023 IMPACT

THE ADVOCATE CONFIDENTIALITY BILL SIGNED INTO LAW

After four years of working to codify confidentiality for victim advocates, the bill was signed into law this summer. This new law protects communications between advocates and survivors of sexual abuse and gender-based violence. Confidentiality creates a safer environment for victims of abuse in Tennessee to report and seek needed resources. The years-long journey of this bill proves the power of grassroots advocacy, statewide coalitions, and perseverance.

FACILITATED **16** COMMUNITY ADVOCACY TRAININGS

Trainings occurred both in-person and virtually and included Advocacy 101: Demystifying the Tennessee Legislature, Policy 101: Tennessee's Gun Laws, Conscious Volunteer Training, and Action Planning intensives.

HOSTED $\mathbf{2}$ days on the hill with $\mathbf{70}$ attendees



2023 IMPACT

On March 27th the Nashville community experienced an unfathomable tragedy as three 9-year-olds and three adults lost their lives during a mass shooting at the Covenant School. In response, AWAKE stepped into a leadership position co-organizing a peaceful rally just three days later and mobilizing the community to advocate for laws that could prevent firearm death.
